<u>Previous Knowledge:</u> In year 1, we named and identified the four countries of the United Kingdom. We started to look at human and physical features too.

Key Vocabulary we need to know:	
Human features	things that are made or built by humans
Physical features	anything that is on the Earth naturally
coast	The area where the sea and land meet is called a coast.
forest	A forest is an area mostly covered by trees that is home for lots of plants and animals.
hill	A hill is a landform that is higher than the surrounding land and has a visible summit; they're like mountains, only shorter.
mountain	Mountains are areas of land that are much higher than the land surrounding them.
sea	smaller bodies of salt water,
ocean	An ocean is a huge body of salt water.
river	A river is a moving body of water that flows from its source on high ground, across land, and then into another body of water.
city	A large town.
town	A town is a larger settlement than a village.
village	Villages are small settlements with a small number of houses for a few hundred people.
country	A country is land that is controlled by a single government.
